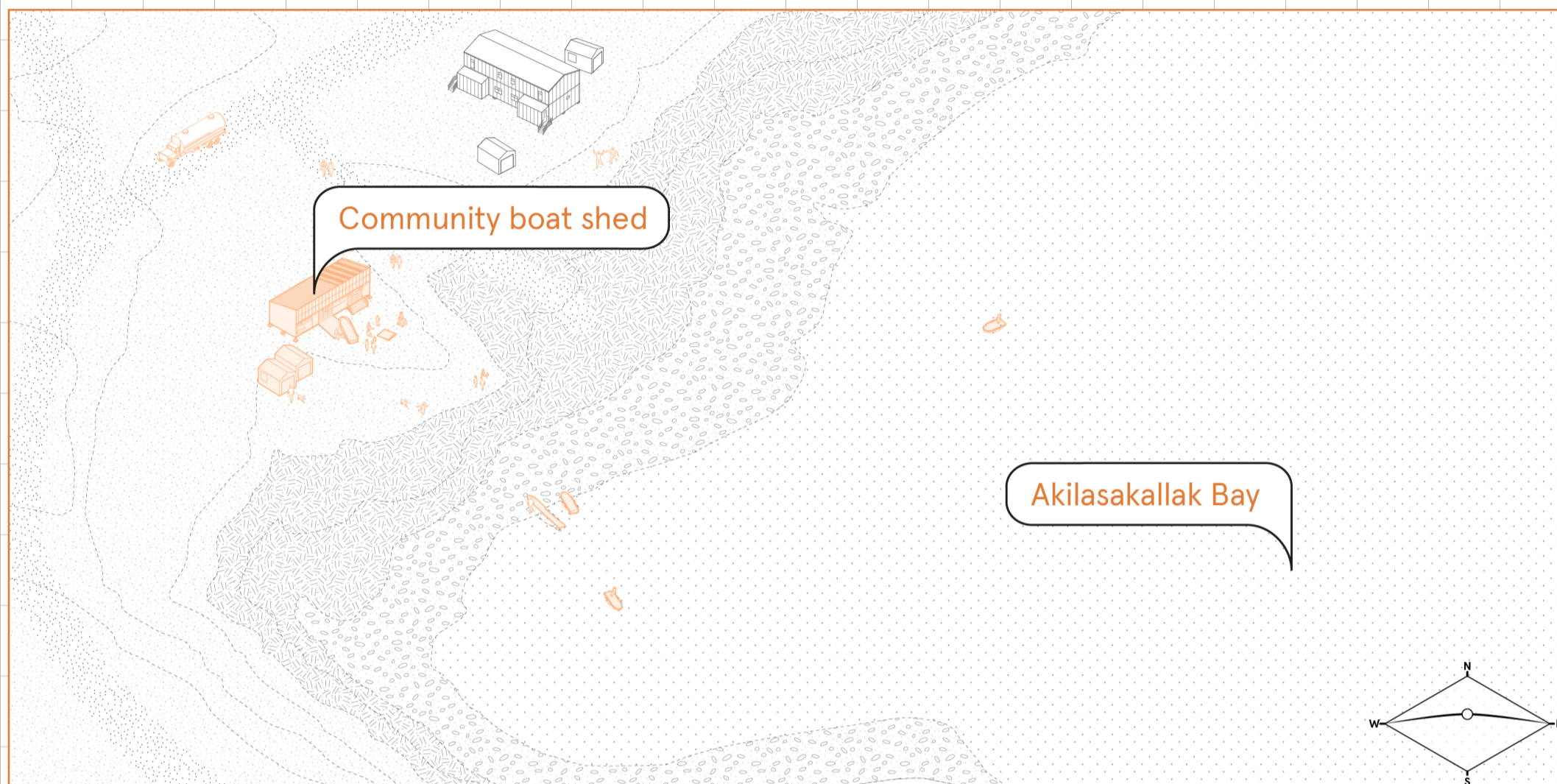

### MEANS OF ACTION

- 5.1 Protect hunting grounds, fishing spots and berry picking areas around the village
- 5.2 Use slopes as opportunities to offer views on valued elements of the landscape

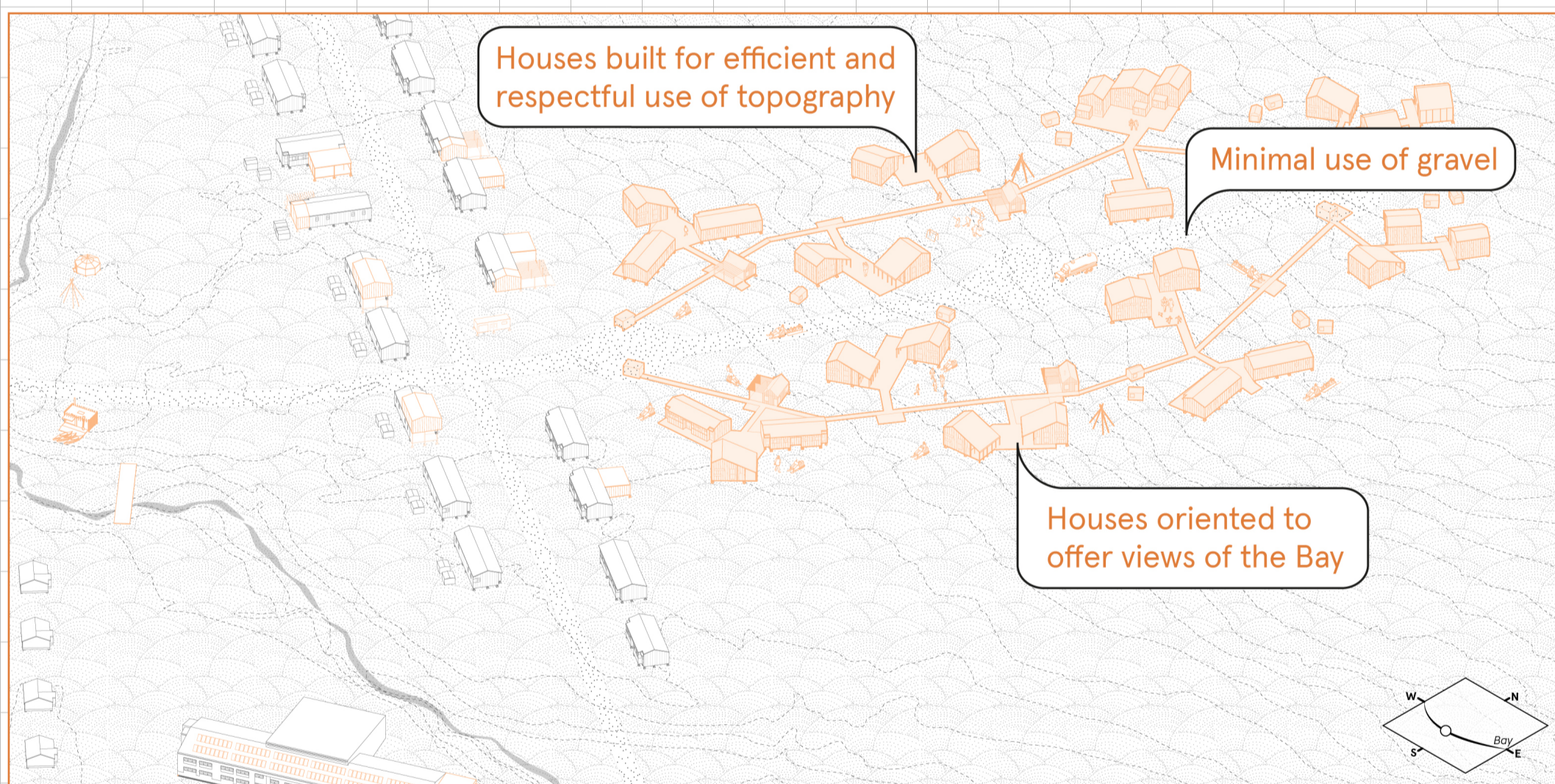
### VILLAGE CENTER

The Akilasakallak Bay is at the core of the cultural landscape in Kangiqsualujuaq. If the village center don't have slopes that can give every resident a view on this natural splendor, it has an access to the bay's banks. These banks must be preserved and cared for to maintain the quality of the landscape they offer. A community boat shed could also be built to both store and repair nautical elements.



### RESIDENTIAL AREA

The slope North of the village offers possibilities to extend an existing residential area, with beautiful and meaningful views towards the Bay. Strategic site selection and adequate foundations optimize the topography and minimize the use of granular materials (including for roads), all in favor of preserving nature and the surrounding landscape.



### NEW DEVELOPMENT

The slopy terrain east of the village offers opportunities to build new houses with great views towards the Bay. Each house is elevated and oriented so that all living spaces face the Bay. Overall, the clusters profit from the spectacular natural surroundings.
